from the publisher a new mother longing to write is judged hysterical and confined to her bedroom where she slowly loses herself in horrific fantasy a young girl stirred by two beings a handsome young man and an ethereal white heron is forced to make a choice between them a love affair quashed by convention ignites during a sudden storm these tales of remarkable and ordinary lives in nineteenth century america are told throughout women s voices that call out from the kitchen hearth the solitary room the prison cell stories by louisa may alcott willa cather kate chopin and edith wharton as well as by others less familiar reveal a universe of emotions hidden beneath parochial scenes american writers claimed the short story as their national genre in the nineteenth century and women writers made it the most important outlet for their particular experiences a unique selection with an introduction notes selected criticism and a chronology of the authors lives and times

authors include sylvia plath janet frame may mccrory angela carter nadine gordimer and margaret atwood

contains thirteen short stories by american women writing in the nineteenth and early

twentieth centuries

brings together 28 lively and readable stories many of which are re published here for the first time since their original appearance includes fiction by maria edgeworth mary shelley elizabeth gaskell and margaret oliphant

known for her vivid portrayals of creole life in louisiana kate chopin 1851 1904 wrote during her brief literary career poignant and perceptive stories about the emotional lives of women bypassing many of the conventions of 19th century realism she won praise for her realistic portraits of the inhabitants of bayou and urban areas this collection of nine stories contains one of her most famous works *the storm* a haunting and ironic tale of miscegenation additional stories include *the lady's divorce* a gentleman of bayou *the cadian ball* from bayou folk a respectable woman a night in acadie and *azelie* from a night in acadie the dream of an hour and the title story written with grace delicate humor and a keen understanding of the human especially the female psyche these stories are a superb introduction to an important american writer whose literary career was cut short by the harsh criticism directed at her novel *the awakening* 1899

an anthology of 47 stories all written by women and depicting the wild woman archetype of women who run with the wolves by clarissa pinkola estes who provides an introduction to the book the contributors include angela carter anne rice alice walker and fay weldon

featuring such great contemporary authors as anne tyler bobbie ann mason and ann beattie this superb anthology contains 21 stories from writers who have been published since 1960 well crafted and luminous these stories tell of men and women of birth death and rebirth of culture fantasy and fears authors include cynthia ozick penelope lively fay weldon and others

this collection of essays by both new and established critics provides stimulating readings of many of the scottish women writers working in scots and english today a variety of critical approaches ensures diversity in these essays on fiction poetry and drama while in the growing field of scottish women s writing it is impossible to be all encompassing these essays cover a wide range from the most established muriel spark to newer writers such as laura hird it includes new readings of janice galloway and a l kennedy and examines the work of poets such as carol ann duffy and kate clanchy dramatists such as sharman macdonald and sue glover as well as writers including jackie kay who cross genre boundaries exploring the interface between gender and nation as well as the excitement and energy generated by much of this writing these essays fill a gap in critical response to contemporary scottish women writers contributors to this volume include carol anderson barbara bell helen boden sarah m dunnigan ksenija horvat margery palmer mcculloch glenda norquay lynne stark susan triesman features the first book to present a range of critical responses to contemporary scottish women writers contemporary both in terms of the subject matter and the critical theoretical approaches looks at a range of genres fiction poetry drama
